Caroline Lucretia Herschel was born on the 16th of March 1750 in Hanover Germany. As part of a family of ten, she had seven siblings. She was the youngest of them all, the eighth child of Isaac Herschel and Anna Lise Moritzen.

Caroline originally moved to England to sing with her brother William Herschel, as he was a music teacher. He gave her singing lessons everyday, One of William's other interests was astronomy. Caroline also enjoyed astronomy. As she enjoyed watching her brother at work, she agreed to become his assistant. William Herschel and Caroline Herschel moved to London so William could follow his dreams of astronomy. Caroline became his house keeper but she did not like his wife very much.
